NIGHT LIFE ARAB SPRING

The groundbreaking Tunisian singer Sonia MBarek, who is a master

of the beguiling, ancient songs of *ma'luf* and is also known for her interpretations of *raqs shargi* (the cabaret songs from Egypt and other Middle Eastern countries which are used in belly dancing), makes a rare United States appearance with a concert at the CUNY Graduate Center. (See page 16.)
